The Story Behind

...the hymn

"In the Bleak Midwinter"

"In the Bleak Midwinter" is a poem by the English poet Christina Rossetti. It was published under the title "A Christmas Carol" in the January 1872 issue of Scribner's Monthly, and first collected in book form in Goblin Market, The Prince's Progress and other Poems (Macmillan, 1875).

It has been set to music several times. Two settings, those by Gustav Holst and by Harold Darke, are popular and often sung as Christmas carols. Holst's is a hymn tune call Cranham, published in 1906 in *The English Hymnal* and simple enough to be sung by a congregation. Darke's is an anthem composed in 1909 and was intended for a trained choir; it was named the best Christmas carol in a 2008 poll of leading choirmasters and choral experts.

In verse one, Rossetti describes the physical circumstance of the Nativity of Jesus in Bethlehem. In verse two, Rossetti contrasts Christ's first and second coming.

The third verse dwells on Christ's birth and describes the simple surroundings, in a humble stable, watched by beasts of burden. Rossetti achieves another contrast in the fourth verse, this time between the heavenly angels present at Christ's birth with Mary's human ability to give Jesus physical affection. The final verse shifts the description to a more introspective thought process.

Who warned you to flee from the wrath to come? ⁸ Bear fruits that befit repentance, and do not begin to say to yourselves, 'We have Abraham as our father'; for I tell you, God is able from these stones to raise up children to Abraham. ⁹ Even now the axe is laid to the root of the trees; every tree therefore that does not bear good fruit is cut down and thrown into the fire."
